In 2022 she participated in the Ós Residency at the Icelandic Textile Center in Blönduós, Iceland and the La Baldi Cultivate residency in Montegiovi, Italy. Inga works as the Marketing and Operations coordinator for the James Renwick Alliance for Craft (JRACraft) in Washington, DC.

Benedetta Castrioto is a project manager and curator with a passion for multidisciplinary projects. Interested in institutional and social critique, her research and work has been concerned with artistic and cultural production as praxis. In particular, she focuses on the intersection between social and environmental justice, and their incorporation in institutional practice and artistic process. He also makes art, videos and performances that grow out of the practice of drawing and visual story-telling.
